COMMUNICATION IS KEY

- Case managers will call you the first week of school to introduce themselves
- Case managers will introduce themselves to your student also the first week of school.
- Be aware that the case manager will not necessarily have your student in their classes
- The case manager can guide you to the team-teacher in the class your student may be struggling
- Check teacher blogs for due dates, practice videos, handouts, direction on projects, etc.

SUPPORT CLASSES

- Math support (elective)
- Study Skills(elective)
- Reading (elective)
- Foundations class (2 blocks, one block will take place of an elective)
- Small group recoupment class (computer based)students can recoup credits lost if they have failed a class

Extra Support /ASE - Academic Support and Enrichment (Know where your student is going during this time!)

MATH TRACK

Decision making rubric form is introduced in 11th grade

- I. 9th Grade: Algebra I and Algebra support or I Block per semesters of Foundations
- 2. 10th Grade Geometry and Geometry Support
- 3. Three your student will meet graduation requirements for graduation, but will not be eligible for most 4 year schools.
- 4. Students have to have documentation that they struggled through math consistently.
- 5. Good to provide the child a safety net if you know they struggle with math.

Graduation Requirements for 4 Year School

- I. 9th Algebra I
- 2. I0th Geometry
- 3. I Ith Advanced Algebra/Algebra II
- 4. 4th Math (AMDM. Pre-Calc. Etc.)

COLLEGE BOARD TESTING



For special education students who plan to attend a 4 year post-secondary program and/or take AP classes, follow the plan below for SAT/College Board accommodations.

- Contact person is Elizabeth Leonard, Lassiter SSD Coordinator
- All College Board accommodation requests are completed online by the SSD Coordinator. If additional information is needed, the SSD Coordinator will contact parents.
- All ACT accommodation requests are completed on paper with documentation included and sent to ACT.
 - For 50% extended time, the Extended Time National Testing form is completed.
- For additional accommodations such as 100% extended time, marking answers in booklet, etc the ACT Special Testing form is completed.
- After these forms are completed by the SSD Coordinator, they will be sent home for the parent to send.
- Usually end of year 9th grade it is recommended to apply
- 9th grade PSAT no accommodations we use information for educational planning
- College board is strict and accommodations have to be documented over for several years consistently

ASSIGNMENTS AND TESTING GENERAL POLICY

- Testing due one day extra day for each day you are out unless the student knes.
- Assignments are the same unless the assignment was given before you are out.
- Check due dates online
- Have a system in place for your student to keep track of his or her own assignments/stress it their responsibility

IF YOUR CHILD IS STRUGGLING NOW



- Accommodations of extended time on assignments is not always the best choice; teaching students to chuck assignments into manageable increments is our main goal in preparing them for college or the work place
- Humanities is an elective and we recommended struggling students to take Study Skills instead
- Math track for 2 year math, however they may move on even if they are on this track but prepare them for that choice
- Criteria we used for placement in study skills and 2 year math plan pertained the level of COGAT scores, participation in 8th grade a self-contained class, levels of executive functioning deficits and working memory.
- Remember HS is a lot to juggle and we need to prepare for them not to struggle. First year is overwhelming for most students and even more so for those with disabilities.

IEPS/TRANSITION

- Student is expected to attend their IEPs after the age of 14
- Transition goals are not monitored at school but it is something reviewed yearly to discuss steps for postsecondary options
- Progress monitoring is updated every 6 weeks for IEP goals and objectives along with report cards

STRATEGIES FOR SETTING UP A SYSTEM FOR HOMEWORK

- Homework folders, accordion folders, or folder (whatever works)
- Check grades on a consistent basis to establish self-monitoring skills
- Set a regular time and place to study
- Make sure your child actively plans with you to set up study systems
- Review notes daily
- Read to retain
- Break the preparation into manageable pieces (by topic or chapter, for example, or by math problem set), and schedule study time in planner.
- Focus on self-quizzing, rather than merely re-reading material.
- Flashcards are a good way to review facts and figures, Or turn key concepts and terms into mnemonics for quick retrieval.
- For math problems, the key is practice, practice, and more practice, to master formulas and techniques. Alter the wording of problems in the textbook and homework assignments to prepare your child for variations that may appear on the test. To prevent careless errors, have him use graph paper, number each step of each equation, and write in big, bold handwriting.


