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NOTE TO THE STUDENTS

Co-curricular activities are considered a vital and integral component of the CHS. You are encouraged to join and become actively involved in one or more of these activities. They can be a means by which you could realize further personal growth and educational enrichment.

This handbook contains a description of the clubs and activities offered at CHS. Hopefully, you will use it as a reference to assist you in selecting those co-curricular areas you wish to join. An updated list of class sponsors and meeting dates/times may be found in the CHS Main Office or online at the Campbell Website.



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Sponsor's Role

- 1. Serves as a link between the School and the Organization/Club and should assist the Organization/Club in achieving its goals and objectives.
- 2. Attend meetings and programs of the Organization/Club.
- 3. Responsible for managing their respective Organization/Club funds including following district purchasing policies and procedures.
- 4. Develop fund-raising plans.
- 5. Monitor financial position of club account by reviewing the Organization/Club accounts financial records.
- 6. Monitor collecting and safekeeping of funds until turned over to the bookkeeper/secretary, and other fiduciary responsibilities.
- 7. Ensure Organization/Club expenditures have been approved in Organization/Club minutes prior to submitting to campus bookkeeper/secretary.
- 8. The club sponsor must be a full-time faculty member at the campus.
- 9. Club sponsors are responsible for verifying their balances and resolving any discrepancies with the campus bookkeeper monthly.
- 10. Providing for the safekeeping all money collected in the school. Monies that are collected at a school campus location must be secured and kept in the campus vault/safe nightly.
- 11. Provide proper accounting processes with the bookkeeper for transactions.
- 12. Ensure that expenditure of funds are in compliance with applicable state laws and local board policy.
- 13. Authorize formation of any Organization/Club Accounts using the Notice of Intent form which can be found in this handbook.
- 14. Deny any expenditure that is deemed inappropriate.
- 15. Support/Mentor members of the organizations.

CLASS OFFICERS

Each class elects officers (President, Vice President, Secretary, Treasurer and Historian) in the fall to represent them throughout the current school year. Class officers should maintain a C average, be responsible and willing to represent their class in a variety of ways, including fundraising activities. For more information, contact your class sponsor.

FRESHMAN CLASS

Freshman Class officers work hard as leaders of the class to motivate others in various fundraising activities and to promote a sense of Spartan Pride at pep rallies, in recognition of student achievement, and at any class activity. They try to be a shining symbol of what Campbell High School stands both academically and, in the community, at large. The Freshman Class raises money for activities held during the junior and senior year (proms and class trips and activities). While class officers are elected, we strive for TOTAL class involvement. Class officers meet as needed throughout the year based on upcoming activities and events. Some of these events/activities include: Building the homecoming float, creating class games for the lunchroom, coming up with fundraising ideas for class events, and creating events that promote SPARTAN PRIDE!

Sophomore Class Officers are responsible for advising and overseeing the activities of the Sophomore class. The Sophomore Officers also raises funds for class activities and contributes to school-wide activities such as spirit week, dances and any other extracurricular activity, from sophomore year to graduation. Leaders of the Sophomore class are to establish class goals on class unity, spirit, funds, and events. These officers are to promote and monitor these goals to keep the class on task. Officers are to encourage students to appreciate and value their classmates, school, and community and organize activities in support of each. Officers are responsible for organizing and attending all class meetings.

IUNIOR CLASS







The school nurse is not available after school hours and therefore is not available during club meetings or events.

Sample Club Constitution

Article I: Official name and purpose of the club or organization

- **1.1** The name of the organization will be the (name of club) of Campbell High School.
- **1.2** This organization will have its purpose, (identify specific purpose of club) as directly approved by the sponsor and the school principal.

Article II: Membership requirements

All students enrolled in Campbell High School are eligible for membership.

Article III: Meetings

Meetings will be held (state day and time, such as Wednesday at lunch) unless a special meeting is called.

Article IV: Club Officers

1.1 Officers

The club shall consist of the following:

- President
- Vice-president
- Treasurer
- Secretary

1.2 Duties

The club president will have the following duties:

- Preside over meetings
- To plan and prepare an agenda for the club meetings.
- Prepare an agenda for each Organization/Club meeting.
- Be familiar with Robert's Rules of Order for conducting a meeting and practice this procedure.
- Remain impartial set an example for others.
- Know and understand the Organization/Club constitution.
- Carry out the decisions of the group.
- Know the responsibilities of the Organization/Club officers.
- Keep the group goals directed and on track throughout the year.
- Work closely with the Organization/Club sponsor.
- Be aware of deadlines for submitting required Organization/Club documentation.
- Communicate with club sponsor regularly

The club vice president will have the following duties:

 To serve as club president if the president becomes unable to fulfill his or her duties either temporarily or permanently.



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- To support the club president.
- Be prepared to take on any specific duty that is requested of you.
- Be aware of deadlines for submitting required Organization/Club documentation.

The club treasurer will have the following duties:

- To maintain complete and accurate record of all club receipts and disbursements.
- To oversee club fund-raising efforts.
- To supervise the preparation of the club budget.

The club secretary will have the following duties:

- To maintain accurate minutes of each meeting.
- To carry out all correspondence for the club (consider having a reporting secretary and a marketing secretary for social media/flyers)
- Keep an updated membership roster.
- · Be responsible for all correspondence.
- Maintain and organize all files.
- Be aware of deadlines for submitting required Organization/Club documentation.

Article V: Elections

The club will hold the election of officers once a year. The voting will take place by secret ballot. Names of the officers will be recorded with the student council.

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Section 4: Student clubs may not discriminate against a member or prospective member based on race, color, religion, sex, sexual orientation, gender, gender expression, national origin, marital status, or disability, except as specifically exempted by law.

ARTICLE FOUR - OFFICERS

- Section 1: The officers of this organization shall be the President, Vice President, Secretary and Treasurer. (Add any other officers the club may need)
- Section 2: To be an eligible officer of this club, students must: ______
- Section 3: The term of office shall be one school year.
- Section 4: Duties of the officers shall be included but not limited to the outline specified in the Campbell High School Student Club Handbook.
- Section 5: In the event that an officer does not continue to meet the qualifications for said office, the officer may be removed by majority vote.
- Section 6: Upon the removal of an officer, the club members shall nominate and vote for a new officer.

ARTICLE FIVE - MEETINGS

- Section 1: Regular meetings of this organization shall be held monthly, more as needed.
- Section 2: Special meetings may be called at any time by the president upon petition of
 - majority members of upon petition of majority officers upon three days' notice of
 - such meeting to members.
- Section 3: A quorum shall consist of a majority of voting members present at any meeting.
- Section 4: Roberts Rules of Order shall govern the club in the order of its business.

ARTICLE SIX - ELECTIONS

- Section 1: Election of officers for an academic year shall be held at the beginning of the school year.
- Section 2: Only voting members may vote for the election of an officer. If a member is absent and wished to vote, he/she must give a written ballot to the sponsor, in order for his/her vote to count.
- Section 3: Notice of elections shall be given two weeks in advance to the day of the elections.

ARTICLE SEVEN - EXECUTIVE AUTHORITY

- Section 1: There shall be 1 or more full time faculty or staff sponsors who shall be member's ex-officio, without vote.
- Section 2: Sponsors shall be nominated by the club officers and voted upon by the members of this organization.
- Section 3: Powers and duties of the Sponsor are as set forth in the Campbell High School Handbook for Clubs and Organizations.

ARTICLE NINE - COMMITTEES

Section 1: There will (not) be standing committees for this club.

ARTICLE TEN - DUES

Section 1: There shall (not) be dues to join this club.

ARTICLE TEN - AMENDMENT AND BY-LAWS

- Section 1: This Constitution may be amended and adopted by ¾ of the membership present and voting at any regular/special meeting.
- Section 2: Notice of official Amendment shall be given exactly one week from the date of vote.

The club must have their own by-laws. Being a member of a national charter does not cover the individual club bylaw requirement.

Robert's Rule of Order

AUTHORIZATIONS

What Is Parliamentary Procedure?

Is the body of rules, ethics, and customs governing meetings and other operations of Organization/Clubs, organizations, etc. Allows members of the Organization/Club to be heard and to make decisions without confusion.

Why is Parliamentary Procedure Important?

Because it's a time-tested method of conducting business at meetings and public gatherings. It can be adapted to fit the needs of any organization. So, it's important that everyone know these basic rules.

Organizations using parliamentary procedure usually follow a fixed order of business. Below is a typical example:

- 1. Call to order.
- 2. Roll call of members present.
- 3. Approve minutes of previous meeting.
- 4. Treasurer's reports.
- 5. Announcements.
- 6. Upcoming events.
- 7. Concerns.
- 8. Date/place of next meeting.
- 9. Adjournment.

The method used by members to express their ideas is in the form of moving motions. A motion is a proposal that the entire membership take action or a stand on an issue. Individual members can:

- 1. Call to order.
- 2. Second motions.
- 3. Debate motions.
- 4. Vote on motions.

The purpose of a motion is to introduce items to the membership for their consideration. They cannot be made when any other motion is on the floor, and yield to privileged, subsidiary, and incidental motions.

How are Motions Presented?



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- 1. Make Your Motion
- a. Speak in a clear and concise manner.
- b. Always state a motion affirmatively. Say, "I move that we ..." rather than, "I move that we do not ...".
- c. Avoid personalities and stay on your subject.
- 2. Wait for Someone to Second Your Motion
- 3. Another member will second your motion or the President will call for a second.
- 4. If there is no second to your motion it is lost.
- 5. The President States Your Motion
 - a. The President will say, "it has been moved and seconded that we ..." Thus placing your motion before the membership for consideration and action.
 - b. The membership then either debates your motion, or may move directly to a vote.
 - c. Once your motion is presented to the membership by the President it becomes "assembly property", and cannot be changed by you without the consent of the members.
- 6. Expanding on Your Motion
 - a. The time for you to speak in favor of your motion is at this point in time, rather than at the time you present it.
 - b. The mover is always allowed to speak first.
 - c. All comments and debate must be directed to the President.
 - d. Keep to the time limit for speaking that has been established.
 - e. The mover may speak again only after other speakers are finished, unless called upon by the President.
- 7. Putting the Question to the Membership
 - a. The President asks, "Are you ready to vote on the question?"
 - b. If there is no more discussion, a vote is taken.
 - c. On a motion to move the previous question may be adapted.

Voting on a Motion

The method of vote on any motion depends on the situation and the by-laws of policy of your organization. Voting may be done By Voice. The President asks those in favor to say, "aye", those opposed to say "no". Any member may move for an exact count.

Parliamentary Procedure is the best way to get things done at your meetings. But, it will only work if you use it properly.

- 1. Allow motions that are in order.
- 2. Have members obtain the floor properly.
- 3. Speak clearly and concisely.
- 4. Obey the rules of debate.
