



Course Syllabus: Advanced Placement (AP) English Language & Composition

Course Description

This course is designed to engage students in becoming skilled readers of written in various periods, disciplines, and rhetorical contexts while gaining an understanding of the interactions among a writer's purposes, audience expectations, and subjects. This course has three sections:

In this course, students take on the role of a prominent food critic, and students are cordially invited to critique the Advanced Placement English Literature and Composition virtual restaurant.

Throughout the course, students dine on master creations and grow in understanding, as they learn to appreciate how, through the centuries, authors have employed the tools of language to tap different senses and to create meaning.

AP Literature & Composition A is the first half of the course and is only offered during the Fall Term. AP Literature & Composition A includes Modules 0 – 4.

AP Literature & Composition B is the second half of the course and is only offered during the Spring. AP Literature & Composition B includes Modules 0, 5 – 8, and 10.

AP Literature & Composition Y is the entire course and is offered during the Fall and Spring terms. AP Literature & Composition Y includes Modules 0 – 8, and 10.
