Primary Change: MLA no longer requires the URL with the citation of a web-based source. If your teacher requires you to present the URL address, type it immediately after the date accessed: Eaves, Morris, Robert Essick, and Joseph Viscomi, eds. *The William Blake Archive*. Nonperiodical Publication: These are sources that are not released on a regular schedule. An entry for a Nonperiodical publication on the Web usually contains most of the following components, usually in sequence:

- 1. Name of the author, compiler, director, editor, narrator, performer, or translator of the work
- 2. Title of the work (italicized if the work is independent; in roman type and quotation marks if the work is part of a larger work)
- 3. Title of overall website (italicized)
- 4. Version or edition used
- 5. Publisher or sponsor of the site; if not available, use N.p.
- 6. Date of publication
- 7. Medium of publication (Web)
- 8. Date of access (day, month, and year)
