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What is a Title I school?

- Mableton is one of 46 Cobb Schools who are identified as Title I.
- Title I is a federally funded program which provides services and resources to schools based on student economic needs.
- Services include additional personnel, student resources, and parent support.
- This program is intended to supplement not supplant what we already do in our classrooms.
- The purpose/goal is to generate high levels of academic achievement in core subject areas for all students, especially those students most in need.

What are our school's Title I Schoolwide Requirements?

- A comprehensive assessment is conducted each year and a plan is developed to meet needs of the whole child.
- The plan includes strategies, programs, budget expenditures and assurances that we make as a school.

What are the overreaching needs for the students at Mableton?

Literacy

- Lack of basic phonemic awareness
- Limited vocabulary and background knowledge of content
- Lack of strategies for comprehension and complex texts to choose from
- Inconsistencies with instructional and assessment practices in literacy

Mathematics

- Limited mental math/problem solving skills Lack of fluency with basic math facts Limited math vocabulary and background knowledge of content **Inconsistencies** with instructional practices in math
- Lack of teacher content knowledge/strategies to teach math

Title I School Improvement Plan and Goals

- <u>ELA:</u> (Literacy) The percentage of 1st -5th grade students scoring proficient or advanced on the Reading Inventory will increase from 39% to 45% by the Spring of 2022.
- <u>Math</u>: The percentage of K-5 students scoring proficient or advanced on the Math Inventory will increase from 31% (spring/2021) to 40% by the Spring of 2022
- <u>Science:</u> 75% of 5th Grade students will score in the Developing performance domain or higher according to the Science Touchstone assessments each quarter.
- <u>SEL</u>: (Social Emotional Learning) By the end of the school year, students in grades K-2 will be able to demonstrate an understanding of Emotional Regulation by providing at least three examples of how to identify and manage their emotions when feeling anger (from 63% to 70%), sadness (from 70% to 75%), or worry (from 70% to 75%). By the end of the school year, students in grades 3-5 will be able to demonstrate an understanding of Emotional Regulation by providing at least three examples of how to identify and manage their emotions when feeling anger (from 63% to 70%), sadness (from 70% to 75%), or worry (from 76% to 80%), sadness (from 77% to 80%), or worry (from 80% to 84%).

- Provide students with real-world problemsolving situations in mathematics to practice at home with their families.

- Attend Virtual Curriculum nights and pick up resources from my child's teacher.
- Get CTLS Parent app, read and refer to the class newsletter with ways to help support my child at home.
